ULSU General Assembly Meeting

On November 7, 2019 the ULSU had our November General Assembly meeting. At this meeting we started off by electing our new Arts & Science Representative Ryan Lindblad, discussed planning information for our "Meet the GA Day", and checked in with executive and GA initiatives.

During this meeting I brought up an initiative dear to me as a Health Sciences student which was proposing to remove substance advertising from the ULSU calendars. On our ULSU calendars we hand out to the general public we have had our main drop down advertisement revolve around substances over the past few years. In 2017-2018 it was the One Stop Vape Shop, and for the current academic year it is the B.O.B. Headquarters. As an organization that reflects the student body and advocates for health and success of all of our students, I feel it would be best to remove these substance advertisements moving forward-specifically the drop down ad on the calendar that is consequently seen every time one looks at the ULSU calendar. I was pleased to see the GA was heavily in favour of this, and we will be moving forward to examine substance free advertisement options in the future.

I also explained that I would be taking GA headshots so everyone had a professional photo to use for business and SU purposes. I would be sending out the sign up sheet later in November.

I played the role of the superstore clerk and it was my responsibility to ensure families were buying groceries for their families, filling their prescriptions, and buying adequate clothing for the duration of the simulation. My role helped to identify how challenging it is to simply provide for one's family while simultaneously coping with pressure to function in society. Not everyone in our society can afford to buy a week of nutritious food, or to fill their prescriptions on time, and through this portion of the simulation many of my peers got to experience this first hand.
