Fresh Fest

Fresh Fest 2020 went from September 8-12 and featured a series of social and educational events. This included a nationwide online concert that was paired with in-person watch parties at The Canadian Brewhouse and Hudsons Canada's Pub, A Conversation with Angela Davis, First Lecture, speed friending, GooseChase, as well as various presentations. This was the result of many hours from the Fresh Fest Committee and I am grateful for the collective effort and creative thinking that went into this year's activities. It was successful in the sense that the people who did come to the events had a good time and left feeling more connected to the community. However, a particular challenge with hosting a mostly virtual Fresh Fest is attendance and getting the word out. This was the case with Students' Unions across Canada that all saw lower attendance than usual for their Frosh Week/Orientation Week programming. This was definitely a learning experience as there are many things that went well and could be improved.

As part of the organizing committee for A Conversation with Angela Davis, we will be co-hosting a second speakers event in January. This is a partnership between the Students' Association at MacEwan University, University of Alberta Students' Union, University of Regina Students' Union, University of the Fraser Valley Student Union Society, and the Students' Union of UBC Okanagan. I am excited to continue this unique collaboration - stay tuned for more information!

Clubs

A virtual Club Rush Week was hosted from September 14-25. This consisted of directing people to our Clubs & Greek Life List on the website, which contains profiles of all the ratified clubs and interested people can apply directly to clubs. Our Clubs & Student Involvement Assistant, William Baliko, also helped to build and moderate a Discord server. Discord is a communications platform where we created a channel for each of the currently ratified clubs. Interested people could visit each channel and interact with the club executives, similar to visiting a club's table during a regular Rush Week.
