

Power of 25 Fundraising - Faculty of Management

Electronic Media

The use of electronic media for advertising events and creating awareness of student issues increased in the 2010-2011 academic

year. The continued use of the ULSU Events Facebook group created in the previous academic year to advertise events has been as successful, if not more, as in its inaugural year of use. It has served its purpose to inform many students of services and events put on by the Students' Union with some events showing more than 200 attendees and few showing below 100.

Also notable is the creation of ULSU's own Vimeo account. Videos detailing the roles and responsibility of each Executive Council member and the Mayoral Candidates Forum have been a unique way of distributing information about the ULSU.

The ULSU previously attempted to create an account on the popular video viewing site YouTube in the Fall of 2007 with their first video receiving over 6,000 views in the years since then, but little was done with this site since the first video was posted in October of 2007. Very few viewers have been drawn to the page in the years following with the next videos being posted in March of 2009, receiving 209 views.

A Year in Review of 2010-2011

ULSU-EUS Fashion Drive

The ULSU/EUS Fashion Drive was a slightly altered form of the Fashion & Food Drive organized by Sara Ritchie (Education Rep 2009-2010) in the fall semester of 2009. For two weeks, clothing was collected at various locations around campus and then it was sorted and sold for under \$5 to raise money for the ULSU Emerging Teacher Award. This \$500 scholarship was for education students in their last year of study who were often too busy teaching full time to have a part-time job and support themselves. At the end of the day, we raised \$521 which will allow this scholarship to be given out for an additional year as it is funded solely by donations.

This event would not have been possible without the help of the ULSU staff with organization and advertising this event. The Education Undergraduate Society and the ULSU General Assembly also contributed by providing volunteers to help out during the collection, sorting and selling of clothes.

The remainder of the clothing was donated to the Salvation Army and the Catholic Charities Clothing Bank here in Lethbridge. I found this event to be a great success as we reached our goal of \$500, we gave students a chance to purchase clothing for an extremely reasonable price, and we helped out our community as a whole. Compost Program

Beginning in the fall semester of 2010 the Campus Compost Program began its first wave of expansion. After reaching an agreement with Caretaking, the ULSU Food Court vendors and the Zoo, we began composting. Under the agreed upon system, fruits, vegetables, tea bags, and coffee grinds are all compostable, while other materials such as meat, egg shells, and sauces are not. They were given their own compost bins and were responsible for emptying them on a daily basis into the Garbage Room on level two of the Students' Union Building. From the Garbage Room, Caretaking transported the compost to the open pile compost pit in the Bonevard on the southern end of campus. The finished compost was used by Facilities for various projects around campus.

After this initial expansion, the project hit a roadblock; it needed more support and coordination from the University before being able to expand. In order to secure this, a new and revised campus composting proposal was drawn up and presented to members of the U of L Senior Administration. From the proposal, a meeting was scheduled between representatives from the ULSU, Senior Administration, Caretaking, Housing, and Sodexo to discuss the future of composting on campus. The meeting was ultimately a success as Tim Hortons soon began composting, and hard commitments were received to begin expanding into Residence. Caretaking will be looking into the feasibility of composting in lunch rooms across campus.

After a follow up meeting between the ULSU, Housing and ORS, plans were finalized for the expansion of composting into Residence with a pilot project in Piikani House. The ULSU provided the bins and promotional materials, ORS provided support through different incentives and encouragement from RA's. Finally, Housing and Caretaking has agreed to ensure that the compost will make it from Residence to the Boneyard.

A QIP proposal has been put forward to purchase the bins and promotional materials needed to expand composting into Residence. Ideally, the stakeholders would like to see the current composting system established residence wide by the Fall of 2011. To date, the current system has been widely successful as the University vendors are diverting mass amounts of waste from the landfill, and Caretaking is having little trouble handling it. The ultimate goal of the composting project is to see a campus wide and fully participatory system. I am happy to say that the project is well on its way to reaching that goal. U of L Spirit Committee

The Enhancing Community and School Spirit Committee (ECSS) was formed with the intention of evaluating and improving the sense of community and school spirit that exists at the University of Lethbridge. This committee was composed of various members of the University of Lethbridge community, from staff to students.

The ECSS began working in September to determine the best way to evaluate different kinds of activities and events that were already occurring on campus that promoted school spirit. This discussion led to the realization that a basic understanding of what defined community and school spirit was required. The committee determined that in addition to more traditional concepts of community and school spirit, we needed to look at other areas such as how Fine Arts can build community or how school spirit can be built upon academic activities.

These discussions led to the formation of a survey that was distributed campus wide during exam period in the Fall semester. The survey was brief and sought to collect direct responses from students regarding their current experiences and thoughts about school spirit, their desires, and wishes for this campus. The goal of the survey was to determine how the University of Lethbridge as an organization could better promote the development of community school spirit. Over 1000 responses were collected, and the results are still being compiled and analyzed for trends and significant patterns. Grade Appeals



Grade Appeals

Each year the ULSU VP Academic counsels students on various academic issues – notably grade appeals and academic processes. Under University of Lethbridge legislation, grade appeals can only commence if there is proper evidence to suggest that a student's grade has been "improperly determined."

"Improperly determined" grades can be a result of any number of specific factors, however formal appeals are rare as many cases are resolved without going to appeal, while others do not warrant grade appeal status.

The following is a breakdown of the number of inquiries about grade appeals from students per faculty. In 2010-2011, only seven cases out of 30 went to formal appeal stage.

- Arts and Science: 12
- Education: 4
- Fine Arts: 4
- Health Sciences: 5
- Management: 5

CAUS Involvement

The ULSU, the University of Alberta Students' Union (UASU) and University of Calgary Students' Union (UCSU) make up the Council of Alberta University Students (CAUS) which represents the interests of over 70,000 students to the Alberta government. ULSU President, Taz Kassam and VP Academic, Keith McLaughlin served as the ULSU delegates to CAUS in 2010-2011. McLaughlin served as Vice-Chair of the organization. CAUS pursues initiatives that are designed to make post-secondary education in Alberta more affordable, accessible, and of a higher quality. CAUS advanced a number of priorities to the provincial government in 2010-2011 including:

- Regulating non-instructional fees
- Increasing base operating grants to universities
- Increasing grants and bursaries to students in need
- Making elections more accessible to students

Throughout the year, CAUS met with a number of government representatives including the Premier of Alberta, the Minister of Advanced Education and Technology, and various Members of the Legislative Assembly in order to advance CAUS' priorities. CAUS also met with all of Alberta's opposition parties. While CAUS did not get all of its goals accomplished, it made strides to ensure that moving forward, future Students' Union executives in Alberta would have a strong foundation to build upon with the government to advance affordable, accessible and high quality postsecondary education in Alberta. Associations (CASA) this year. The ULSU was one of the most active members of CASA. Allan Hall served as a member of the CASA Bylaw Committee, Policy Committee, Finance Committee, Interim National Director/Chair Review Committee and the National Director Search Committee. Hall rewrote CASA's policy on tax credit and provided feedback on all of the polices written by the Policy Committee. Hall was also heavily

involved with the work done on CASA's new constitution and operating procedures.

From an advocacy perspective, CASA had a satisfactory year with its annual Lobby Conference in Ottawa. Over the course of the conference, CASA arranged 112 different meetings. with several high profile Ministers and party leaders such as Michael Ignatieff, Gilles Duceppe, Jim Flaherty, James Moore, Rob Moore, Peter MacKay, Steven Fletcher and Rona Ambrose. A majority of the MPs, Senators and civil servants that we met with during the week were very receptive to the recommendations that CASA made.

This was a very significant year for CASA from an

internal perspective. Arati Sharma, the previous National

Director, announced to the CASA membership that she

in plenary, we elected Zachary Daylor as the new National Director for CASA, and he has done an excellent job thus far in his role as National Director.

Heading to the Parliment Building

At the CASA Annual General Meeting, the members voted to implement a new voting structure, fee structure and a new constitution. The new voting structure will require a two-thirds majority of full members to pass motions. For special resolutions, it requires a two-thirds majority of the full members and at least 50% plus one of the full-time equivalent (FTE) students to pass this type of motion. CASA also voted in favour of a new fee structure system that will be based on a progressive FTE student model (kind of like the Canadian tax system but with FTEs instead of income) rather than being tied to the annual gross revenues of the student association. This will be a better system for the ULSU. Lastly, we voted in

favour of a new constitution for the organization. Due to an organizational hiccup, we have been using the 2002 CASA constitution. Over the course of the year, the Bylaw Committee worked very diligently to craft a constitution that better reflects the practices of the organization and what the membership wanted in its governing documents. There were numerous speeches given by the various distinguished guests and attendees along with a performance that was nothing short of spectacular with a cultural component that best suited the event. Dr. Mahon continues to support the NAS Faculty and FNMI student initiatives while engaging with and embracing the Aboriginal Community in Southern Alberta.

Blackfoot Confederacy and Native Wellness Conferences

Aside from my duties as ULSU – FNMI Representative, I am a member of the Kainai Board of Education (KBE) – Saipoyi Community School PAC Chairperson. I was selected to attend both conferences during the month of November as a board representative of the KBE Organization. The focal point of the conferences surrounded the notion of "holistic healing" and the many traditional methods and strategies available when coping with issues pertaining to education, land and housing. Renewal and retention of the indigenous culture continues to remain an active force within the Aboriginal populations in North America, therefore the idea of land studies becomes more crucial to sustaining a culture and its practices viable for the next generations.

Native Awareness Week Celebration February 28 – March 4, 2011

We recently celebrated the Annual Native Awareness Week (NAW). Festivities filled with cultural activities and events that promote the Aboriginal traditions and practices. Each day consisted of a scheduled activity or program such as the fashion show held in the University atrium formed by Professor Linda Many Guns and her NAS 3850 class. The dresses were so elegantly designed and incorporated the beautiful bead work and stitching used by the Aboriginal designers Pauline Dempsey and Gerri Many Fingers. Dance and drum performances by the students of Holy Spirit School Division were also included with the week of events. The NASA Club hosted an "Out of the Box" presentation that included an information session regarding the "Fracturing" issue that has recently become a great concern to the Blood Tribe. Aside from the politics there was an open mic inclusive of Aboriginal talent where indigenous artists were encouraged to showcase their perspective talent. To end the eventful week was a premiere of "Circle of the Sun" along with smaller films created and developed by Aboriginal artists.

FNMI Alumni, SET Committee, GA and KBE Meetings

Throughout my term as the FNMI Representative I attended the above mentioned meetings; their main focus - generally speaking surrounds the notion of "education". How to improve certain programs while providing support to Aboriginal students is usually the focal point. They aspire to recognize the student and the social barriers they face when seeking an education whether it is elementary or post secondary - the challenges are similar. It is a continuous struggle with the Federal Government where funding is concerned, therefore I encourage all First Nation students to actively get involved with governance and politics at any level because the Aboriginal people require your knowledge and wisdom to guide them into the future! The 2010-2011 year was phenomenal in residence; building upon the success of last year Rez Wars. There was more programming this year in terms of quantity and quality than in any of the last four years. Residents had a chance to participate or attend plays, Stampeders games, two separate Flames games, a

ski trip to Castle Mountain, various cabarets, and nine different Rez Wars events just to name a few! This year the Organization of Residence Students (ORS) made a significant impact in our local community through fundraising and philanthropy. This year Residence Assistants (RAs) ran the annual Coulee Cleanup, raising \$700 for Lethbridge Adopt-a-Family, \$380 for Muscular Distrophy, over \$5000 for World Vision in the 30 hour Famine, and the Underwear Affair Run.

Not only have the residents had access to top notch events, but they have also received substantial upgrades to common and working spaces; P100 was rearranged to contain the main common space. This space has so far served to centralize the building and was the direct result of a hardworking and dedicated team. The Piikani study centre, (K111), the Hive and the Den all received various upgrades as well. ORS was also fortunate enough to establish its own council chambers and storage area in Tsu t'ina. Being that ORS and residence as a whole has been confirmed in its identity as a fun place to be, ORS Executive along with Housing Services and our own Academic Committee tried to improve student academic life on campus. There have been many presentations from groups such as Arts & Science Advising, professors from different faculties and student run sessions on how to succeed. Along with the improvements to the P300 study centre, the Airport Lounge also received extra tables and chairs in order to create more workspace for the students living in University Hall.

There will be a significant amount of physical change in residence space in the years to come with University Hall and Kainai expansions, as well as the potential for a new building in Aperture Park. This means that it will be important for next year's Residence Representative to work to maintain the current community, while showing the flexibility and understanding needed to embrace the change. As an Arts & Science representative, it is entirely possible to make a difference through the facilitation of ideas, opinions and concerns to the University of Lethbridge about post secondary education. This initiative is linked to criticisms made by many Arts & Science students who feel the academic advising at the University of Lethbridge is sub-par. Not surprisingly, many of these frustrations are voiced by students who wait until their final two years to setup their first appointment with an academic advisor, only to find they are behind with respect to graduation. I feel the Faculty of Arts & Science could do a better job of encouraging students to meet with academic advisors earlier in their undergraduate career and on a more consistent basis. All in all, my experiences with both the ULSU and the University of Lethbridge have been rewarding. I would sincerely encourage any student interested in becoming involved in the ULSU to put his or her best foot forward in helping the organization continue to make positive changes in the campus community. 


Health Sciences Rep Report

The 2010-2011 academic year was one which presented both challenges and opportunities for the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Lethbridge. As with many other faculties and public institutions, the Faculty of Health Sciences faced increased budgetary challenges coupled with continuing pressure to expand program offerings.

These challenges were met head-on by Dean Chris Hosgood, whose leadership and managerial ability allowed the Faculty to not only develop, but to thrive. During the Fall semester, Dean Hosgood was the subject of a committee tasked with reviewing his eligibility for a subsequent five year appointment as Dean. The committee was multidisciplinary, including representation from the University of Lethbridge Students' Union. We reviewed statements from faculty members and community partners, and held discussions with Dean Hosgood about his vision of future challenges and opportunities for the Faculty. It was unanimously decided to approve his eligibility for another five years as head of the Faculty of Health Sciences.

Another significant milestone for the Faculty of Health Sciences this year was the move to the newlyconstructed Markin Hall. Jointly shared with the Faculty of Management, Markin Hall provides a permanent home for the Faculty. Unique on campus are an Addictions Counselling Lab and Simulation Health Centre, both of which work to ensure Health Sciences students are equipped to make significant contributions to their fields. The ULSU, represented by President, Taz Kassam, was present for the official Grand Opening of Markin Hall with University of Lethbridge President, Dr. Mike Mahon, and Premier Ed Stelmach on October 21, 2010. An ongoing challenge in any faculty remains engaging the students who comprise such a vital part of the ULSU. This semester was no exception, and finding unique and effective ways of motivating the general student population to get involved will remain a challenge for incoming USLU Executive and General Assembly members.

This was the inaugural year for the ULSU Teaching Excellence Award. The ULSU created this award to formally recognize and honour teaching excellence at the University of Lethbridge. This was a student run and driven teaching award. Only undergraduate students were eligible to nominate instructors, and the committee that decided the award was composed solely of undergraduate students.

Laurence Decore Awards

These awards were established in 2001 by the Government of Alberta, in honor of the Provincial Liberal leader Laurence Decore. This scholarship recognizes post-secondary students who have demonstrated outstanding dedication and leadership in student clubs, student government, college/university life, and community involvement.

The U of L allocates 12% of the annual tuition fee increases to the ULSU, to be used to develop quality initiatives. These funds are provided on a continuing basis, with a three year term of notice, should the allocation be discontinued.



Elections & Referendums

Referendums

In the summer of 2010, the ULSU Executive embarked on a review of its fee structure upon learning of acute budgetary strains within ULSU budgets that threatened student services with future cutbacks. The Executive learned that ULSU fees on average were 18% below the national average of schools of a comparable size. Recognizing this and the needs of students, the Executive Council chose to ask students via referendum to approve a fee increase in order to sustain and enhance student services.

QUESTION #1 - ULSU FEES TIED TO CONSUMER PRICE INDEX (CPI)

Whereas the University of Lethbridge Students' Union (ULSU) fees currently do not account for annual increases in inflation. And whereas this will inevitably result in cutbacks and reductions of current student service offerings, the ULSU wishes to pose the following question to its membership:

"Do you authorize the University of Lethbridge Students' Union to tie the annual student fees it collects to the Consumer Price Index (CPI), as determined by Statistics Canada, using 2011 as the base year for calculation, in order to account for annual inflation?"

RESULTS:

YES votes: 919 vote - 54% NO votes: 781 votes - 46%

The ULSU made the unenviable choice to ask students to increase fees because the existing fee structure was not sustainable and threatened student support such as club funding, travel and conference grants, along with several other services. Rather than face future cutbacks to student services the ULSU asked its students to vote on the referendum questions.

In the end, a majority of students voted in favour of

sustained and improved student services, ensuring that in the future all students at the University of Lethbridge can continue to access extraordinary services.

QUESTION #2 - ULSU FEE INCREASE

Whereas increased enrollments at the University of Lethbridge, and increased membership of the University of Lethbridge Students' Union (ULSU), has produced strain on the ULSU Operations Budget, and whereas the ULSU favours increasing levels of student services, the ULSU wishes to pose the following question to its membership:

"Effective Fall 2012, do you authorize the University of Lethbridge Students' Union to implement a one time increase in the annual fees it collects for operations to result in the following charge:

Full Time Students From: \$47.44/year (\$23.72/semester) to: \$57.44/year (\$28.72/semester)

Part Time Students From: \$23.86/year (\$11.93/semester) to: \$28.86/year (\$14.43/semester)?

RESULTS:

YES votes: 982 votes - 58% NO votes: 723 votes - 42%

General Elections

The ULSU General Election process began February 7, 2011 and ended on March 11, 2011. The total voter turn out was 25%, with the Residence students having the highest participation of 63%. *Written by Keith McLaughlin - 5th year Political Science major*
