PAUL DANIELS PRESIDENT

This year, The Students' Union accomplished a great deal for students at the University of Lethbridge. Although there were challenges throughout the year, we were able to overcome them and serve our students well. There may have been criticisms, but the students should be in awe of what has been achieved this year.

Allow me to quickly recap some of the accomplishments of this year's Student Council. New Vision and Mission Statements were created, giving direction to The Students' Union for today and tomorrow. Revisions were made to the Health and Dental plan, (a service widely used by many students), such changes as the addition of the Tuition Protection Program (a benefit available to all students in the plan who are forced to withdraw for serious health reasons). Starting in the fall 2004, periodontal and endodontic work will once again be covered by the dental plan.

Another service by The SU that has been expanded is the number of scholarships being offered. Scholarships help many students cover some of the costs of their education; this year The Students' Union allocated an additional \$5000 towards new scholarships. Also, by working with Cocacola, we are making an additional \$30,000 in scholarship funding available to U of L students over the next 10 years. It is important that we help students today, but also pave the road to the future.

The Zoo pub saw many adjustments this year as well. A few of these changes are the return of a weekly Thursday night event and a new non-smoking policy. Although the U of L administration had concerns with the weekly Thursday night event, after months of working pro-actively on the issue, students saw the event return. On another note, the dance floor in The Zoo has been refinished and the carpet has been replaced. Furthermore, this year The Zoo began offering lunch service with a menu and prices better than most of the fast food outlets on campus.

We have also recently developed a SU Student Computer Assistance Program. Beginning in September, we will be giving 20 students a free computer (with software) each semester. This program provides a much needed service, since computers are fast becoming an essential tool for students.

This year, we also saw some development and changes on campus. For example, the creation of a new U of L logo. In the next few years, we will see the construction of the Regional Health and Wellness Centre; an expansion of the current physical education building. The new centre will house a triple gymnasium and a huge fitness centre, as well as many other needed facilities.

Provincial and federal lobby efforts are an important aspect of the representation done by the elected officials of student associations. This year, CAUS, the provincial lobby organization which represents university students, partnered with ACTISEC, a similar organization for colleges and technical institutions. This sort of partnership has never been done



before. The Students' Union played an important role in the creation of this epic partnership. While the Universities Act has been replaced with the Post-Secondary Learning Act, our tuition cap remains; this cap helps to ensure that students have access to an affordable post-secondary education system.

This year our Students' Union has accomplished a great deal with CASA, our federally lobby organization. Back in October, we met with Paul Martin to discuss the future of the post-secondary education offered to Canadians. Subsequently, the Prime Minister's Speech from the Throne noted several planned changes that were almost identical to CASA policy. This year, CASA also assembled a 'Wall of Debt' on Parliament Hill to draw attention to the increasing issue of student debt. The wall represented over 4000 students with a total debt load of \$90 million. In March we submitted a national petition with over 45,000 signatures to parliament calling for changes and improvements to our education system.

Throughout the year, The SU has also worked to maintain and expand many of the services we currently offer our students, such as the test bank, which is always growing to include more classes.

Another example is the grade appeal process, which has been streamlined. Some of the innovative efforts undertaken this year included a contest to find a school anthem. Another initiative was the ground work for a new source of funding offered to clubs to help cover their costs; this year we had the most clubs ever ratified.

Thanks to everyone who helped The Students' Union and the University have a successful year. It has been a very rewarding experience. *Written by Paul Daniels - 4th year Arts & Science, with a Major in Philosophy.* 



### JERRAD KUBIK VP Academic

In serving my second term as Vice President Academic, I was able to concentrate on finishing much of the work I either began last year or finish much of the work that was passed down from my predecessors. While much of the work that the VP Academic, and The Students' Union as a whole, may be considered to be 'behind the scenes', it is work that will have a positive influence on the education students obtain at the University of Lethbridge.

Involvement and visibility have been, and will continue to be, the keys to success for our Students' Union. Through effective communication, interactive events and worthwhile opportunities we were able to open more doors for students to actively participate in their university experience. Students will soon have the opportunity to be a very influential voice at all levels of government and within Canadian society, and it will be the responsibility of student leaders to ensure that these voices are heard. Not only must post-secondary education remain accessible and affordable to every academically qualified Canadian, but, perhaps more importantly, post-secondary education must not be made into a commodity. Unfortunately, it seems that our provincial government is standing aside as our administrations, with their corporate-dominated boards, begin to move down that dangerous path. As they increasingly equate tuition fees with the "quality" of education offered, and attempt to run our public universities as revenuemaximizing businesses, everyone loses and education becomes more and more an activity for the elite. Students need not be "held hostage" by these "pay for quality"

arguments that, in turn, allow the government to reduce its funding more and more. Post-secondary education is a public responsibility and has to remain that way. The only way for students to combat these threats is to use their influence and their voices in order to make post-secondary education both a public and an election issue. Then, the public can decide the direction, affordability, and accessibility of our education system, and not the board of governors.

I had another great year with The Students' Union, and after three years the Union, the people, and the cause have indeed grown on me. It's hard to drop everything and essentially walk away when there is so much left to do. However, I have faith that my successors will take up the reins and continue to represent the rights of current and future students, and to fight the good fight. *Written by Jerrad Kubik - 4th year student, working toward BA in Religious Studies.*

I was a member of the General Faculties Council, the GFC Library Committee, the Library Fines Appeal Committee, and the University Budget Committee, among The GFC Library Committee others. came up with mission and vision statements, and they extended the library hours for April. One major decision that the General Assembly made this year was to pull out of CAUS, a provincial lobby group. This decision was made on the basis that our concerns were being ignored by that organization.

Jerrad and I also worked together to create more scholarships. When we started at The Students' Union, we offered \$2500 a year in scholarships. At the present we offer \$8000 annually in scholarships and bursaries.

I was also pleased to represent The Students' Union at a handful of functions. I entered the Pronghorns Hockey golf tournament, spoke to the parents and partners at New Student Orientation, and gave out an award at the Juried Arts Exhibition. The Board of Governors is the ruling body on all University matters, and is comprised of 20 members representing faculty, staff, community members and of course students. The board of governors typically meets monthly and covers a broad range of subjects. This year alone the board approved the first stages of the Regional Health and Wellness Centre; this \$20 million facility will contain a triple gymnasium and a climbing wall. The board also approved the new university of Lethbridge logo, an exciting logo that gives the University a modern image.

This year was challenging for university students in Alberta as the province proposed a revised universities act. This new act, called Bill 43, had several major changes to the previous act which were damaging to Alberta's post-secondary students. I had the pleasure of being able to serve as the student representative on the Board of Governors Governance Committee. Working with such inspirational people like Jim Horsman, I was able to express the concerns that students have with the new Bill. My concerns were addressed and a letter was written to the Minister of Learning listing all of the student concerns. Several major amendments were made to the bill that results in a better future for Alberta students.

I had the distinct pleasure of being able to congratulate graduating U of L students during the June convocation. This experience also provided me with the opportunity to meet many people including:

- Gwyn Morgan, President and CEO, Encana, and
- Don Getty, Former premier of Alberta.

This year Dr. David A. Naylor signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the European Space Agency (ESA) which signed him on to a 10 year contract for the SPIRE space mission. This incredible landmark was the first ever Canadian MOU signed with ESA and it happened in Lethbridge. As a Board member I had the pleasure of witnessing this historical event and had the tremendous opportunity to meet with several politicians and ESA officials.

This year alone I had the opportunity to sit on five committees, the GFC Honorary Degree Committee, the Arts and Science Committee on liberal education, Arts and Science Council, SU Constitutional Review Committee and the Board Governance Committee. Each committee provided its own unique challenges and experiences and I have learned so much.

It is always a pleasure to be able to take part in the social elements of the University experience and the Board provided its fair share. Each board meeting was usually accompanied with a dinner or activity. The chance to mingle and socialize with Many high profile business leaders, faculty and university administrators gives access to large social network that can last for a lifetime.

It was determined that the resistance the university felt to this practice was based on philosophical principles what the university stood for as an institution which provided a broader Liberal Education, without the same degree of specialization in only one Furthermore, and to wit, discipline. arguments had been made that the degrees obtained at this institution are valuable precisely because of this, and printing majors might pigeonhole graduates into a narrower field of subjects.

Post Christmas Students' Union activity was far more subdued for me, mostly due to a vastly increased 5-course load semester. However I did maintain my commitments by attending the regular General Assembly meetings, as well as the Arts and Science Executive Council. While the A&S Council generally doesn't deal with matters that affect students in many patently measurable ways it was still a worthwhile experience. Student representation on this committee is essential at least insofar as it clearly demonstrates that students have a right to not only be aware of all aspects of University Governance, but to have the opportunity to actively participate.

## HEALTH & DENTAL PLAN

The Health and Dental Plan office has been a great place to work during the 2003/2004 school year! Our insurance, through R.W.A.M. Insurance Administrators Inc. has operated very well and we have been Able to offer a good plan with very reasonable premiums to the students. It seems that the "bumps" we encountered in the past have been smoothed to the extent that we have been able to stabilize our coverage. This has allowed us to be in a "pro-active" state when it comes to predicting next years renewal rates. This is partly due to the cutting back of the dental plan that we did in 2002. Scaling back our coverage allowed us to steady the amount of claims being submitted by the students and it also ensured that we were not getting ourselves in a position where we would need to increase premiums the next year to maintain similar coverage. This year, we will be able to increase the dental coverage being offered to the students, while maintaining the same premiums charged.



We are also adding an exciting feature to our Health Plan Coverage. All Full-time students will be covered under the "Tuition Protection" program. This program will allow those students who must withdraw for serious medical reasons, up to a \$10,000 benefit to help offset the cost of lost tuition and medical expenses.

I feel that our Health and Dental Plan is moving in a favorable direction, and I am thankful to Jules Cormier, our General Manager for seeing the concerns at hand and taking the initiative needed to address these issues. Also, thank-you to all the office staff who pitch in during opt-out time and who assist me in educating the students about their insurance coverage.
