Legislative Review Committee

The Legislative Review Committee spent many hours this year reviewing the bylaws and policies of the Students' Union to implement improvements. Some of the policies we changed included the honorarium advancement policy. This was altered so that no honorarium is advanced for the General Assembly members of the Students' Union. We also added some policies concerning club probation and de-ratification. In addition to these, a lot of small changes were made such as grammatical or wording changes to our policies.

This year we accomplished a lot regarding bylaws. In particular, we removed the Board of Governors representative position. Rather than having a representative for this position, we decided that the VP Operations and Finance shall sit on this committee as they will be able to provide more input regarding finances and will be able to better understand what is going on in that committee. An additional General Assembly position was also added; the First Year Representative. This position is for an undergraduate student in their first year of study at the University of Lethbridge, and will be voted in at the time of a by-election in the fall semester. We believe that this position will enable students to get involved with the ULSU at an early stage, and will also allow us to represent and reach first year students better. Executive Accountability Committee

The Executive Accountability Committee (EAC) is an internal committee within the ULSU whose mandate is to conduct and organize an evaluation of the Executive Council. The General Assembly and staff members do the evaluation, with the Executive Accountability Committee creating the system of evaluation and analyzing the results. The system of evaluation we used this year was an online survey, which allowed us to collect anonymous reviews. This enabled us to collect results

that truly represent the honest opinion of each General Assembly and staff member regarding the executive's performance. The survey system has been used for the last three years and continues to be a useful and well-constructed tool for feedback. The object of collecting these reviews is to promote transparency within the ULSU and provide feedback for the Executive Council, enabling and promoting improved performance. This year's survey produced some overall excellent feedback including great comments toward the Executive Council's endeavors. The recommendations for change or improvement were to create clearer communication between the General Assembly and Executive Council, and to foster greater

bonding between the General Assembly and Executive Council. These results were discussed in one-on-one meetings between members of the General Assembly and the Executive Council. A report was also presented to the General Assembly during the November monthly meeting. The Executive Council did a spectacular job this year and their efforts in every aspect are well noted. Fee Consultation with the U of L

There were a few notable fee changes that the University was looking to implement, such as the removal of the fee associated with applying to graduate. There was a provision for the assessment of a \$10 fee for every student per semester to be allocated to the Fine Arts Department, this will allow students free access to any Fine Arts productions. However, it is a worry that other departments will begin to look at implementing these blanket levies in upcoming years, which is definitely something to watch out for. Multi-Faith Prayer Space

A multi-faith prayer space has been an ongoing project for the past year and a half. It has been the goal of the ULSU to have a designated space allotted for students who wish to pray, meditate, or observe any religious practices that they so desire. Currently, Facilities is having a difficult time finding a room that is sufficiently underutilized, and one that will provide the necessary space and resources for a multi-faith prayer space. I am hopeful, however that a temporary space (with the hope that a permanent home will be found once the second phase of the Destination Project occurs) will be allocated in the near future. Destination Project

One of the most important projects that the U of L has undertaken in recent memory, and in fact, the largest capital project that has ever been pursued, is the Destination Project. This includes a new Academic Science building, a power plant, and the renovation of University Hall. The project initially secured 212 million dollars in funding and was slated to be completed in the early 2020's. However, current economic realities in Alberta have resulted in a reallocation of funds, which means that the project has less money at the outset, and likely will not be built as quickly as was expected. However, it is sorely needed, as the current lab space in University Hall has been out of date for decades, hopefully things will look better after the May 5th election. Sean Glydon

Outdoor Wellness Space

The Students' Union approved Quality Initiatives Program (QIP) funding in the amount of \$34,000 to create an outdoor wellness space that could be utilized for half-court basketball, field hockey, volleyball, badminton or tennis. The purpose of this initiative was to encourage healthy living and active sport participation on the part

of our students. Unfortunately, due to budget realities as well as the number of projects that Facilities is currently working on, the project has been moving at an extremely slow pace, and we have yet to have space allocated for it. Grade Appeal Report

While this year I saw many students with regards to academic grievances, only two grade appeals took place to completion with the assistance of the Students' Union. Michael Kawchuk oversaw the first as it occurred during the summer when I had a time conflict. The second occurred later in the summer and into the fall where I participated in the committee. My general observations, if I can be so bold as to place them here, is that while many students were interested initially in pursuing a grade appeal, there were many reasons along the way that deterred them from completing the process. Some students were able to satisfy their need by talking to their professor, others were intimidated by addressing the dean or did not want to put in the extreme effort it would have taken to produce an appeal package. Overall, the process was intimidating; with little success for improved grades. It was understandable there were so few appeals. However, let it be understood, the Students' Union is only made aware of appeals when the student initiates that contact. It is feasible to assume that appeals take place by students who do not seek representation or guidance from the Students' Union. A large part of my role in grade appeals is not in the final appeal process itself, but to be a supporter of individual students who come to me with their concerns. I find often, I can be of greater help, to offer advice to help



Lobby Groups & Initiatives

Market Modifiers

One thing that we were not expecting to happen this year was the renewal of market modifiers. Several years prior, stakeholders in post-secondary were promised that market modifiers would be one-time adjustments. However, in the summer of 2014, the government reopened the conversation and 26 market modifier proposals were put forward by postsecondary institutions. Every single one of these were approved except for a blanket tuition increase at the University of Lethbridge. However, a per course market modifier for management courses was approved for the Faculty of Management at the University of Lethbridge. While it was disappointing that we were unable to prevent both market modifier proposals, after more than a month of fee consultation with the Univer-



sity administration, as well as very strong government lobbying, the proposals were submitted to government by the U of L's Board of Governors. Hopefully, this is something that the ULSU will not have to deal with for a very long time, if ever again, as this was quite a difficult process to go through, and frankly, one that I hope is not repeated. It was extremely disappointing to see the government go back on their word concerning the implementation of market modifiers. Sean Glydon


CASA - Strategic Plan

Notable ULSU Academic Events

Academic Speaker - Trevor & Sabrina

Trevor Boris and Sabrina Jalees were the first speakers in this year's ULSU Academic Speaker Series. The event took place at 7:00 pm on October 22, 2014 in the ULSU ballrooms, to an audience of about 150. In an effort to promote different views of academic discussion. Trevor and Sabrina provided a discussion on the diversity in sexuality, with the incorporation of a stand-up comedy portion of their talk. They engaged audience members by tweeting questions and facilitating discussion on the views of homosexuality in society and in their personal lives. —Non Faculty Year-end Reports

Board of Governors Report

The University of Lethbridge is a bicamerally governed institution. The Board of Governors serves as the upper governing body of the institution, responsible for all the administration and financial concerns of the University. The Board features two undergraduate student representatives, currently consisting of the ULSU President and a separate Board of Governors representative. The manner in which students will be represented on the Board was altered this year during a referendum vote to change the ULSU Constitution. The Board of Governors Student Representative position was removed from the General Assembly and one of the Executive Council members will now take on the role along with the President.

There were several issues of pressing concern to students that were seen during my time on the Board. Certainly the most pressing of these issues were the market modifiers presented during the fall of 2014 to the Management Faculty and an overall undergraduate tuition increase, and the budget cut that the University received in the spring of 2015.

Just shortly before Christmas, the Board received news that the Government of Alberta had accepted the market modifier for the Faculty of Management to start in the fall of 2015, but had declined the overall modifier to tuition. The approval was one of 26 market modifiers approved across all the institutions in the province. Late in the spring of 2015, the Board received news that our operating grant would be cut by 1.4% for 2015-2016 and 3.1% for 2016-2017 by the provincial government. Both of these decisions will undoubtedly have negative long term effects on the quality of education, finances, and student fees at our institution. These cuts and faculty tuition increases also cast a shadow of worry with respect to the tuition cap as it is currently not regulated. This has been a hot topic during the provincial election campaigns during the spring of 2015 to see whether or not it will be removed.

A second major student concern at the Board level was

student representation on the Board's Finance Committee. Student representation was re-examined again this year, and the Board decided to allow the students to have a non-voting member sit on the committee. This inspired the change of having a student on the Board with more of a financial background, a second Executive Council member, the Vice President Finance and Operations. This will give us more pull to have a student sit on the Finance Committee, a change we have been striving for during the past few years.

The Destination Project, which will see the addition of a new major science building on campus and a major overhaul of U-Hall, has been a major priority for the Board throughout the year as the Government of Alberta was announcing a new budget in the spring of 2015. It was announced that we would be given less funding than originally thought, and the timeline for the project has been pushed back. The University had been instructed to come up with additional funds in the ballpark of eighty-thousand dollars in order for the project to continue. I hope that the Board continues in many of the positive directions that I have witnessed this year, while continuing to improve in incorporating the student voice. Residence Report

Over the past academic year I was given the honour of serving as president of the Organization of Residence Students (ORS), with its 39 members on Club Council and over a thousand residence students. ORS has demonstrated outstanding efforts and dedication over the past year in regards to supporting the residence community, the University of Lethbridge, and the broader community of Lethbridge. Within residence, ORS has shown great new initiatives this year to improve the quality of our residence community by developing and fostering inclusion and support through social and educational events, social programming, learning and resource opportunities, and everyday interactions with residents.

Some of the social programming that brought residents together this year included: cabarets and RezWars; residence-wide events, such as the 'Superbowl Party' and the 'Oscars Night'; a 'Movie Mill event' to get residents off-campus; a 'Talent Show' to provide opportunities for sharing of talents and confidence building; the 'Success ioi event' for introducing first year residents to learning, coping and study strategies; an 'Ed2500/PSI/II/III' orientation event; Academic Advising and Learning Strategist sessions to support residents in their educational planning; multiple 'Therapy Dog' and 'Health & Wellness' sessions as stress busters during examination periods.

I have also witnessed how ORS has excelled this year in respect to contributions to the U of L community. This year, ORS has had the greatest turnout of students to the Fresh and Breezy Luau during Fresh Fest as ever before, which helped to bring students together in celebration of the new school year. With every member of ORS sitting on a Food Advisory Committee, we achieved improvements of the food services for our U of L community, such as the expansion of gluten-free and vegetarian options at Urban Market, the implementation of more vending machines around campus, and some revisions of the sanitary regulations in food centres to ensure exceptional health standards. Knowing that the ULSU's food bank is a valuable support to hundreds of students and residents alike, ORS members successfully initiated food collection projects that added over 300 items in support of their peers. A used book sale was held by ORS at the beginning of the spring semester that was open for any student at the U of L to re-sell their books to peers. Knowing that the final exam period in December can have serious mental health effects on students, with the support of the ULSU, ORS hung up Christmas lights in various areas around campus to brighten up the mood for students and spread the feeling of community, family, and warmth to the general community. ORS also planned a coulee clean-up event, where residents in teams picked up garbage and helped clean up our campus.

ORS has also showed a great involvement in the broader Lethbridge and Alberta community by delivering various events in support of community services. In the month of October, ORS and residents, in cooperation with the Canadian Blood Services, held a residence-wide blood drive. The event was attended by almost 100 residents and not only got residents to donate blood, but also spread awareness about the current scarcity of blood supplies and the importance of donating. ORS also initiated fundraising and community involvement by entering a team in the 'Relay for Life' event hosted on campus, raising over \$1,000 in support of the Canadian Cancer Society. Numerous members of ORS stayed overnight to show support. In December, ORS and residents, in cooperation with the YWCA, held a residence wide Christmas event that supported the YWCA Harbor House, aiding families in distress. This event involved residents donating to get a Christmas picture taken and supported the YWCA's Stockings of Hope program. This event was highly attended by residents where they delivered over 50 stockings to families and created a great sense of giving to those in need. ORS also participated in the '5 Days for the Homeless' campaign on campus, which supports the Woods Homes Youth Homeless Shelter in downtown Lethbridge. Working with Aramark Catering services, ORS arranged for free coffee to be donated to the U of L community in return for their monetary donation to the campaign. Furthermore, multiple ORS club members participated as 'guest sleepers' for this fundraising event, with one ORS member staying during the whole 5-day campaign raising funds.

In summary, I'm genuinely proud of what the Organization of Residence Students has accomplished this year and am looking forward to what it will become in future years. I have never witnessed a club showing such dedication and passion to improve the quality of life for its members, the U of L, and Lethbridge community. I wish each and every member, whether they are returning to the organization or leaving it to do greater deeds, a successful future filled with moments where they can apply their experience gathered with ORS. 
Quality Initiatives Program (QIP)

QIP funding was reduced this year from \$437,000 to \$415,000 which meant that we had to do more with less. Funding from QIP made it possible for some great events to happen this year. Fresh Fest was one of the most successful ever and we did it with less funding than in previous years. 
- Addition of a First Year Representative

ULSU General Election

The ULSU general election process began February 2, 2015 and ended on March 6, 2015. There was a lot of candidacy interest this year which created a lot of buzz throughout the campus community. There were some positions with no candidates which will result in a September by-election for a Health Sciences Rep, Education Rep, International Rep, First Year Student Rep, and an FNMI Rep.
