



Legislative Review Committee

The Legislative Review Committee was responsible for going through the ULSU's constitution, bylaws, and policies. A big part of the Legislative Review Committee was to update and ensure that what the ULSU stands for was upheld in our legislation. This why it is vital to continuously update and edit the legislation so that the student's best interests are always in mind.

The constitution had three new updates, most notable would be the deletion of the Edmonton Campus Representative as the campus is closing. The bylaws had thirteen changes, most notable changes would be the addition of the First Year Representative and further deleting of the Edmonton Campus Representative. Other corrections in the bylaws are minor grammatical and formatting errors. The policies had eleven corrections, most notable ones included changing the amount of undergraduate signatures to ratify a club from fifteen to twelve. This was changed to unify the needed signatures within the Students' Union. Also changed in the policies was the deletion of policy XXII. This policy regarded cabaret and event programming details, all of the information found in this policy was present elsewhere in the legislation making this policy redundant.

This committee helped to ensure that the Students' Union vision and responsibilities were on track and in

line for the students' best interest, as many refer to the legislation for answers. *Alaina Pyde - double major in Anthropology and Biological Science*

Executive Accountability Committee

A few key areas to work on were communication with the GA, intra-office conflict resolution, and professionalism. Grade Appeal Report

This year, many students came to the ULSU with various academic grievances, though only two required me to sit on the actual grade appeal committee. This seemingly low number is typical of the grade appeal process. The University's procedures for grade appeals place a lot of emphasis on concluding any issues before they reach appeals; this gives mixed results. On one hand, it is a lot simpler to just talk things out with your professor one-on-one instead of bringing things to the committee. Much of my function in the grade appeal process was to act as a supporter or resource-person, and this has surprisingly strong effects. Many students just need reassurance that they actually CAN question their professors, after that they can conclude any issues. However, this process impedes the progress of any appeals wherein students are not satisfied by just discussing things with their professor. The amount of work that goes into a successful grade appeal package is daunting, and that is nothing compared to the intimidating bureaucratic stressors that come with an appeal. An independent 3rd-party appeals advisor would be useful for the University as a whole. Such a position would help many hesitant appellants as well as free up the VP Academic to sit on more appeal committees without any potential for conflicts of interest. *Charlie Helmer-Smith - History/Economics major*

There was a tremendous step forward for student mental health this year. Our relatively new Registrar Susie Kennedy capitalized on a GFC mandate to implement a fall reading break. This required broad support from all across campus, including a very strong student voice (which I was very happy to provide). The new fall reading break went through many forms in its development, but the best system for everyone ended up being the week of Remembrance Day in November. CASA Report

The Canadian Alliance of Student Associations met in Ottawa from May 18th - 22nd, August 10th - 12th, November 19th - 22nd, 2015 and February 22nd - 28th, 2016.

Foundations was the first conference of the year, with a great many presentations such as; Safety Against Women, the Generational Squeeze, Political Climate, Mental Health (presented by the Mental Health Commission of Canada), Canada Student Loans, Mike Corak on PSE, Ross Finnie on Earnings of Graduates, a Government Relations Panel, Advocacy training, Media Training, Basecamp training and Financial Aid. There were several smaller presentations that educated the group on CASA, past and present; as well as where it was going. All elections for Board Chair and the Directors happened at this time. Get Out the Vote prep came afterwards, in August, which was the final wrap up of the program being launched in the Get Out the Vote campaign. There were many planning sessions and strategies built over the course of the conference that each student leader could take back to their campus.

For our campus, the VP External did over 30 classroom talks about voting in the first two weeks of September, as well as using extensive social media to promote awareness. The VP External also hosted an All Candidates Forum which was hugely successful; drawing in over 200 students and community members, leaving nothing but standing room only. All candidates attended. Rachael Harder (C), Cheryl Meheden (NDP), Mike Pyne (L), Kas MacMillan (G) and Solly Krygier-Paine (R). The debate made the front page of the paper, as well as being featured on the radio stations and making national news. Throughout October the Students' Union really focused on getting information to students about how to; register, vote, find their polling station and go about the process smoothly. Advanced Polling was October 9th -12th, and many students were at the polls.

In November, CASA met in Halifax to go over the GOTV campaign and decide on the final policy asks for lobby week in the new year. GOTV, and CASA by extension, re-

ceived much media attention; well over 50 hits, and 1000 views which is more media attention than CASA has previously received. The amount of political attention was enormous - many MP's chose to pay attention to PSE due to this campaign. Voter participation, especially in young adults skyrocketed. Elections Canada stated there had been a 10 – 12 point increase in youth vote! Indigenous ridings were at 20%, 30% and 40% higher than normal depending on location. There were 41,072 pledges nationwide – including our own campus. The priorities chosen were; Youth Employment and Entrepreneurship, Financial Assistance, Equity Seeking Groups (Mental Health, FNMI, International Students) and Research.

In February, the VP External flew to Ottawa to partake in SuperCon; a mix of a lobby conference and the annual AGM. While there, over 157 meetings were scheduled with MP's, Ministers and Senators; of which the VP External attended nine. There was ample opportunity to meet with MP's from all over the country during a meet and greet held at the House of Commons, as well as the wide variety of meetings the VP External attended. The AGM was the last part of the conference, which was a wrap of how the week went, who we met with, and which of us had updated Highrise with meeting details. *Virginia Brickley - VP External*

CAUS Report

Campaigns; Get Out the Vote (End of April, beginning of May) & Mental Health Letter Writing.

Over the course of the year, there have been 11 in-person CAUS meetings, as well as twelve teleconferences. CAUS priorities are decided very early in the year, May 7th - 10th to be exact, but how each priority is addressed was the subject of much discussion and debate over the past year. Our priorities this year were; Tuition and Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees, Campus Mental Health, Student Financial Aid, Student Employment Program, Research, and PSLA Governance. CAUS also presented a budget to Minister Sirgurdson, the Minister for Advanced Education at the time, as well as a mental health letter, which all members of CAUS help write.

A large focus for CAUS was the way tuition is defined and regulated in the province, and what recommendations could be brought forward for the lobby week in April. It was decided that tuition should be returned to legislation. In addition, loopholes for market modifiers should be closed, not allowing Universities to add additional amounts to what students already pay for services rendered. Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees (MNIFs) were the last part of the tuition ask this year, pushing the government to regulate MNIFs in order to prevent gouging students during the tuition freeze.

Mental health was also a large focus this year, as the grant giving all CAUS schools mental health funding is set to expire

this year. With the submission of a mental health letter, all five schools participated in a campaign to get students to write letters to the government to stress the importance of this funding and how it has helped students over the past three years. The ULSU collected 230 letters from students and sent them to the Ministry.

Lobby week this year took place on April 3rd - 8th, open to both outgoing and incoming members of the organizations. The current VP External, Virginia Brickley, and two incoming executives, Cody Ciona and Cameron Howey, attended the conference in Edmonton; participating in meetings with Ministers, MLA's and other stakeholders. All current members of CAUS attended, and were introduced, in Question Period – their names forever going on record in the minutes. CAUS met with Minister Marlin Schmidt on Tuesday, April 5th, and had a good conversation about all of the priorities.

On April 6th CAUS hosted an MLA meet and greet at Central Social Hall in Edmonton, where MLA's and staff, from all the different parties were invited to attend. The event was quite successful, as members of each party attended the gathering. There was food and drink to go around, each incoming and outgoing member of CAUS having an opportunity to meet and talk with MLA's in a casual setting. An hour into the event, the Minister for Advanced Education – the Honorable Marlin Schmidt, arrived. This was a great time for the student leaders to have some individual time to speak freely about post-secondary issues, as well as get to know the Minister personally – developing relationships going forward that are positive and powerful.

Relay for Life

1st Year Managerial Case Competition

The Introductory Managerial Case Competition (IMCC) is a very exciting event hosted at the U of L by the ULSU and MSS, with the support of multiple sponsors. This case competition is restricted to first and second year students, and designed to provide a less threatening introduction to case analysis. Students with minimal, to no case experience are encouraged to attend and gain case competition experience, with the motivation of a cash prize!

The competition is held over one day and is split into two sections. The morning consists of breakfast, followed by a workshop where competitors learn tips and strategies on analyzing a case, as well as the essentials of presenting a case response. After lunch, competitors split into their teams and were sent into isolation with the case. During isolation the students created a fifteen-minute presentation without access to internet or outside assistance. Following a three-hour isolation period, the teams presented their case responses to a panel of judges formed of experienced students, and industry professionals. From there, the top three teams were chosen and awarded their cash prizes.

The event was highly valuable to students inexperienced with case analysis, as it taught them skills that they will use both in higher level classes and in their careers. Having a competition where first and second year students do not have to worry about being overshadowed by more experienced students was also important. *Brendan Warren - Management Representative*



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
FRESH FEST REVIEW


FROSTBITE REVIEW

The Organization of Residence Students is the largest club on campus, hosting as a home, and a community for more than 1000 students who attend the University of Lethbridge annually. This organization, being a large community of students, works closely with the ULSU. We have a unique opportunity of external funding from housing, and a support team of 32 RA's, 4 members of Operations, and 4 Executive members including myself, that creates and moulds the community that ORS cares for deeply. Each year the team changes, and so does the community. Being a part of the ULSU has allowed us to do a lot for our community in residence, and the entire student community who attend this school. You will find a list of events, that I have been a part of in my role on the Students' Union, and of our achievements below.

Fresh Fest

In my view, Fresh Fest is one of the most important events the ULSU hosts. I remember it well in my first year, being an integral part in shaping my 1st year experience. Fresh Fest was something I have been especially happy to contribute to this year. This is one of the first community builders that many students receive attending the U of L, and our residents of course become very involved with it. The result always has them coming out with a smile to start their year. As Residence Representative I had a large part

in preparing our Fresh Fest Luau. This is a dry event with music, food, bouncy castles, obstacle course, and our favorite 100' Slip and Slide. The University has been a huge support for this as well, as we had the joy in having our Vice President, Andy Hakin join us down the 100' Slip'n Slide.

Get out the Vote

With the federal election we had the opportunity to show that students do have a voice, and that they do care when given the chance to show it. With only 1000 students living on campus we did not get our own voting poll, and were instead placed into a neighbourhood outside of our zone to vote. We campaigned on student involvement with the upcoming election and provided resident students with transportation, information, and a proof of residency to make voting easy. Doors for the voting station closed at 7:30 pm, but we still had a line-up of resident students voting until 11:00 pm. From this success I am confident they will provide a more accessible station to residence students in future years.

Operation Christmas Lights

Partnered with the ULSU on the purchase of Christmas lights in 2014-2015 we have been able to continue lighting up the residence spaces on campus. This is an initiative to improve everyone's mental well-being while students draw closer to the start of their finals and the end of their first semester. This is something that the Residence Assistants are always very happy to do for their residents, and the benefits truly show from it.

Recreational Improvement Proposal

Last year the ULSU approved the expenditure of \$36,000 to be spent on an outdoor facility that benefits both mental and physical health. Originally this was a proposal to place tennis courts on campus. This proposal fell through and it was agreed that the money would be used in the following year for a proposal with the same goals. Thanks to the Students' Union, with the help of ORS, I am happy to say we have approved the expenditure of \$50,000 to add a new soccer field to our campus, and that it is currently in the process of being made. This field will be open to the community, and be built nearby the residence community on campus. This accomplishment from student administration will benefit student's mental health and physical well-being, as well as providing a space for our community to grow and interact with one another.

The Students' Union works closely with the Organization of Residence Students, and this relationship has helped a lot in creating a successful community on campus.
